Steve Emt

Steve is the most tenured member of Team USA, entering his 10th year on the team. In 1995, Steve was a drunk driver and crashed on the way home after a night out. The crash left him paralyzed. Steve is now an accomplished motivational speaker sharing his presentation about the dangers of drinking and driving, the importance of good decision making, and overcoming adversities in life with audiences of all ages all over the country. He resides in DeForest, Wisconsin.

In 2005, while doing something he loved to do, Matt fell from a tree stand as he was hunting in the woods. The fall broke his back and the spinal cord injury left him paralyzed. Matt has been with Team USA for 7 years now and currently lives in Wausau, Wisconsin where he works as an accountant for Denyon Homes, Inc.

Shawn is a resident of DeForest, Wisconsin and is selfemployed. He has been with Team USA for 5 years. In 2014, after a long day of work, while driving home, Shawn was distracted by his phone and lost control of his vehicle. The accident resulted in a spinal cord injury for Shawn.

Dave suffered an injury back in 2002 when the vehicle he was driving was hit head on by another vehicle driving the wrong way on the highway. Dave has been with Team USA for 5 years now and most recently earned a Silver Medal at the 2023 World Championships in Mixed Doubles with his teammate Pam Wilson. He is retired and currently resides in Suamico, Wisconsin.

As a passenger in a car back in 1979, the vehicle Pam was riding in was involved in an accident which left her with a spinal cord injury and paralyzed. After her accident, Pam decided to go to medical school to become a doctor, becoming just the 4th person in a wheelchair at that time to do so. She worked with disabled children for 25 years and is still employed as a doctor in Denver, Colorado where she resides. Along with her teammate Dave Samsa, Pam earned a Silver Medal at the recent 2023 World Championships in Mixed Doubles.

Oyuna currently resides in Burnsville, Minnesota and has been a member of Team USA for 5 years. She is a native of Mongolia and during a visit here to the United States in 2000, she was involved in a car accident that left her paralyzed. After the accident, Oyuna decided to stay in the United States and gain her citizenship. She is currently employed by the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, MN as an Academic Coordinator.

Dan Rose

Dan is a resident of Denver, Colorado. In 2011, while serving his country in Afghanistan, the truck he was on patrol in was hit by approximately 1,000 pounds of explosives that were buried under the road. The explosion left Dan with a spinal cord injury. In his words, "I sustained the worst injuries out of everyone in the truck, so as bad as that day was, it could have been a lot worse." Dan has been with Team USA for 3 years.

One day back in 2012, Laura was enjoying the outdoors and working as a landscaper when a 25-foot-long tree branch snapped from above and landed directly on her causing multiple injuries including a broken back which left her paralyzed. She was introduced to the sport of curling in 2019, earned a spot on Team USA almost a year later, and has been with the team ever since. Laura currently lives in Hartland, Wisconsin.
